We've been very busy with finally transferring the public open space and play areas on the Burfield Grange development. We will be working on many improvements over the coming weeks, please be patient with us as there is a lot to do.

Staff update – we would like to say a huge thanks to one of our Caretakers, Ruth, who has sadly left us, thank you so much for all your hard work, we will miss you Ruth! We would like to introduce you to our new Groundsman Andy Sievwright, good luck and welcome aboard!

Finally, as we approach the winter months, the Hub still has a Foodbank basket in our reception area and we are also a donation point for the Ukraine front line, currently collecting medical supplies and dog food. Any donations are always gratefully received.

The same is true for Isabel, creator of our fabulous

dog park here in the country park. Izzy has joined a small group of teens who opt to start their very own business, launching Barks and Baths Dog Washing Service at The BIG Barn just south of Hailsham on 29th July.

Izzy has always had a passion for dogs and has dreamed of becoming a dog groomer for many years, designing and building the Hellingly Dog Park with help from family and local residents three years ago. From September she will be studying Animal Management at Plumpton College, and her course requires her to complete work experience in a pet-related business. What better way than to start your own, and she has already got a head start. As she cannot complete the necessary course to become a full dog groomer until she is 18, she has started with a washing, dry and brush service.

She has been training for over a year with Andrew at Hot Dogs Grooming in Hailsham, where she has washed and dried dogs of all breeds and sizes. Some of her favourites are

Grant Application – Guidance Notes

- The Parish Council, when considering grants, will give priority to those groups and organisations which can demonstrate that other fund-raising efforts have been made.
- Grants will normally only be given towards specific items of expenditure – i.e. equipment or capital projects.
- 3. Requests for grants must be accompanied by either accounts, or business plan if a new organisation or group.

- 4. Grants will not be made for retrospective projects.
- 5. Grants will not normally be made available to commercial or national organisations, statutory bodies or groups from outside the parish unless there are identifiable benefits to residents of the parish.
- 6. All successful applicants will be required to complete an End of Grant Report Form. This will be sent out with the approval letter. Copies of invoices & receipts will be required.

Organisations who have previously received grants will also need to re-apply.

Chair's Report

Public Open Space & Other News.

Public open space is any piece of land, both hard surfaced or green space, which is freely accessible to the wider community for recreation, use and enjoyment. It could be a village green, equipped playground, local park or public roads and footpaths. Previously such areas have almost always been owned and maintained by the local council, the Church, the education authority or some other publicly accountable body. Where local councils own the space it is maintained by the Council and its upkeep paid for through local rates (Council tax). With the advent of large estate developments, in the twentieth century, large new areas of open space have been created and the question has arisen as to who should own, and who should maintain, the space.

Where the spaces are of benefit solely, or primarily, to a small number of properties, for example private roads or amenity space for the use of adjoining dwellings, it is not unreasonable that the upkeep should be the responsibility of the properties that they serve. However, where the space is available for the use and enjoyment of the wider community it is only sensible that the area should be owned and maintained by the local authority.

In recognition of the wider public use the practice developed of the developer being required to offer the space to the local council together with a cash payment (a dowry) to offset the maintenance costs for an initial period. However, developers quickly came to realise that they could avoid the dowry by transferring the public open space to an estate management company with the ability to raise estate management charges from the houses on the developments and a whole new industry has arisen of estate management companies created specifically for the purpose. The practice varies from developer to developer. Some transfer the ownership of the estate management company to the residents

on completion of the estate, but others choose to keep the ownership private.

Hellingly Parish Council believes that the council should own public open space. The Council is therefore happy to take ownership of the public open space on the Burfield **Grange** development with a commuted payment of £200,000 to offset future maintenance costs. The transfer does not cover all of the open areas on the development as some of these such as the private roads and the area of ancient woodland do not afford access to the wider public. Those areas will continue to be administered by an estate management company and the costs of maintenance covered through an estate management charge. However, the estate charges should be considerably less than might otherwise have been the case.

In addition to completing the transfer of the public open space on the Burfield Grange development the Council continues to work with Southern Water and others to reduce the risk of flooding within the Parish. We will never completely alleviate the flooding in the village but we can prevent the sewer floods in Station Road and Park Road and we can work with County Highways to alleviate the surface water floods that are affecting many of our other roads such as New Road, the A267, and the A271. Southern Water has announced a programme of relining the main sewer in Park Road and Station Road, and of diverting the sewer flows from the new Swingate Park development away from the Park Road sewer in addition to the series of non-return valves already inserted in the Station Road sewer.

County Highways has been encouraged to clear blocked culverts and increase the clearance of road gullies. There has been a marked reduction in road floods, but more can be done.

The Council is also embarking upon a review of the Neighbourhood Development Plan. The review has been delayed as a result of the General Election and the need to see what changes central government intends to impose on the area. One thing is clear is that there will be no reduction in the requirement on Wealden to continue to deliver an ever-increasing number of new homes across the District.

However what Government seems to ignore is that District Councils do not build houses and if they really want to address the failure to deliver, they should tackle the developers and require them to build out the permissions already granted (some 8000 in Wealden) before insisting on blighting even more green spaces by granting yet more consents. It is difficult to see where more houses could be built in Hellingly without damaging the environment that so many of us appreciate but I expect property speculators will have their own ideas. We may have successfully defended the appeal on the land south of the A271 near the Boship, but I suspect that a revised scheme will be

proposed! However, it is encouraging to see a planning inspector placing reliance of those Neighbourhood Plan policies designed to prevent the coalescence of Lower Horsebridge, Lower Dicker and Hailsham and to preserve the Cuckmere Valley corridor as a valued green space and ecological corridor. The Council is also continuing to work on the improvements to the Lower Horsebridge recreation ground. The immediate priority has been to open the space up for carparking (which has been done) thereby alleviating the pressure on the adjoining roads. The next stage is to deliver the improved playing spaces.

As always, the Parish Council continues to meet at the Community Hub every second Wednesday of the month, except August, and as an open, transparent, and accountable council, everyone is welcome to attend to raise with us matters of concern, or just to see local democracy in action!

After a rather lengthy process that began before lockdown our church clock is back.

Made by JW Benson of Ludgate Hill, London, the clock was installed in 1837 in the new church tower. Its installation marked the Accession of Queen Victoria to the throne. In 1886 a second dial was added as a memorial to the late Lord Pelham. Earl of Chichester.

The dials face all weathers and the condition was rapidly deteriorating. The gilt numerals and hands were fading and losing their gold



leaf. The decision was taken to restore the dials, dial motion works and associated linkages. The best proposal for the work included removing the clock

from the tower, dismantling the movement completely to clean and re-polish the bearings and gear teeth and replace the weight lines with new stainless steel cable.

The Cumbria Clock Company removed the clock and west dial in August 2023 with the east dial being restored in situ. The west dial was returned in March 2024 with the movement returned and east dial re-gilded in July 2024. The clock now chimes once again as it has for the last one hundred and eighty years and the freshly gilt dials glow in the sunshine!

The work was made possible by a single donation of £3,000, a £500 grant from the Parish Council with the balance raised by The Friends of Hellingly Church. The restoration acknowledges the



dedication of Bryan Hesselgrave who for over 35 years wound and looked after the clock.

- **4.** In a small bowl, mix together the soy sauce and honey.
- **5.** Pour the sauce over the vegetables and toss to coat evenly.
- 6. Season with salt and pepper to taste.
- 7. Garnish with sesame seeds before serving.
- 8. Serve the stir-fry hot with rice or noodles.



What to do in the garden in September

September is here, and there's plenty to be done while you're outside enjoying the last of the year's warmth.

Harvesting crops will keep you busy this month, and there's plenty of work to do tidying and maintaining plants and equipment.

Read on for a list of garden jobs to get on with this month:

Timely Tips

September isn't the time to take your eye off the ball in the garden. Here are some of the main jobs:

- Net ponds now before autumn leaf fall gets underway to reduce the amount of debris entering the water.
- Clean out cold frames and greenhouses ahead of autumn sowing and growing.
- Plant spring-flowering bulbs now, such as daffodils, crocus and hyacinths, for glorious colour next year.
- Keep on top of weeds as they compete with your crops for nutrients and water.

In the flower garden

- Continue to feed and deadhead hanging basket and container annuals — they will often keep going until the first frosts.
- Keep deadheading annuals and perennials to extend their performance.
- Prune any late-summer flowering shrubs, such as the rock rose (Helianthemum).
- Prune climbing roses and rambling roses once they've finished flowering (unless they are repeat-flowering varieties, in which case leave them until later in the year).

In the vegetable garden

- Start planting garlic sets at the end of the month for cropping next year.
- Plant autumn onion sets this month.
- Plant out any spring cabbages, like 'Advantage', sown during the summer.
- Pot up some mint and parsley for the kitchen windowsill for fresh herbs through the winter.

Looking after your lawn

- Create a new lawn from turf or seed autumn weather is favourable for good lawn establishment.
- Raise the height of your mower blades as grass growth slows down.
- Carry out essential lawn maintenance to avoid waterlogging and compaction.
- Apply a special lawn top-dressing after carrying out maintenance work. Follow the instructions on the packet carefully.
- Feed your lawn with an autumn fertiliser which is rich in potassium and low in nitrogen.

Other jobs about the garden

- Improve clay soil before it becomes too wet or frozen by incorporating organic matter and/or horticultural grit.
- Create compost bins in preparation for all the fallen leaves and dead plant material which you'll be collecting over the coming months.
- Raise pots off the ground for the winter by using bricks or 'pot feet', to prevent waterlogging.
- Install water butts to collect rain this autumn and winter. Rain water is great for watering ericaceous plants such as blueberries, rhododendrons and camellias.

Wasp Spider by Michael Blencowe

for Sussex Wildlife Trust

I never thought I'd say this, but I've fallen in love with a spider. And coming from a lifelong arachnophobe that's quite a claim.



Whereas every other spider species sends me screaming in utter terror, the Wasp Spider has melted my heart. They are gorgeous. I met one on the South Downs last weekend and, hypnotised by her beauty, I spent hours with her; lying in the grass, staring lovingly into her eight eyes.

Wasp Spiders' rotund abdomens are delicately patterned with exotic black, yellow and white stripes. Every Wasp Spider looks subtly different – as if each has been individually hand-painted. Their eight legs wear stripy black and white stockings – the sort favoured by the Wicked Witch of the East. This stripy, waspish appearance has given the spider its name and is used as a defence mechanism to ward off predators who equate this colouration with being stung.

They're a relatively new resident in England. The first British Wasp Spider was found near Rye in 1922. Since then they have slowly spread across Sussex and you can find them in any areas of grassland. Here inside their long grass lair, they weave their silky circular webs which – like all spider webs are a masterpiece of arachnoid architecture. As if proud of her accomplishment the Wasp Spider autographs her web with a unique silken squiggle. The actual purpose of this thick zigzag flourish (the 'stabilimentum') is a mystery; although some believe it reflects UV light, luring in pollinating insects who mistake the web for a flower.

Male Wasp Spiders don't have it easy. Physically they lack any snazzy patterning and at 5mm are a third of the size of their hulking female counterparts. And when it comes to spider sex, she dominates the male too. During mating she turns her lover into lunch. So, as the female lies enticingly in her web, the male approaches her with understandable trepidation. It's all about timing.

After she slips out of her old exoskeleton and into something more comfortable, her fresh body is temporarily soft – and so are her jaws. This is her Achilles heel, an opportunity for the male to jump in, do his business and get out before being eaten. This sort of pressure would affect any fellas' performance, but the male Wasp Spider has a trick up his eight sleeves: he can detach his sexual organs, leave them inside the female and scarper.

I always assumed that jettisoning his genitalia allowed the spider to survive, but almost every mating session ends in death for the male. Scientists have found that after this self-imposed castration, the spider's sexual organs keep on fertilising the female and block other males' attempts at mating. The spider sacrifices his own life to save his member and ensure he becomes a father. Wow, what a way to go.

Coffee Time -Rustic pear & cinnamon tart

This is a super easy dessert recipe that you can rustle up in no time.

lining a pastry case here, just a rustic tart with a sweet rye pastry which has a nice nutty flavour which complements the pears. The pears are combined with cinnamon and brown sugar to create a simple and delicious filling

Ingredients

For the Pastry
90g Cold Unsalted Butter (Cubed)
75g Rye Flour
125g Plain Flour
1 Egg
2 tbsp (Icing or Caster Sugar)
Salt

For the filling

4-500g Pears 3 tbsp Soft Brown Sugar Half tsp Ground Cinnamon 1 tbsp Flour 1 Egg (optional for pastry)

Method

Step 1.

Pre heat your oven to 180c. First make your pastry you can either use a food processor with the dough attachment or do it by hand. Whizz together (or crumble together in a bowl using your fingers) the butter, flours and sugar and a tiny pinch of salt until they resemble fine breadcrumbs. Add the egg and mix again until it forms a soft dough. Wrap the pastry up and place into the fridge to rest for at least half an hour.

Step 2.

Peel your pears, cut them in half and take out the core. Finely slice the pears then place in a bowl. Add the brown sugar, cinnamon and flour then mix well.

Step 3.

Roll out your pastry to $\frac{1}{2}$ cm thickness and cut into a large round using a large mixing bowl as a guide. Place some greaseproof on a baking tray then place the pastry on top. Spoon your pears into the middle. Fold up the pastry to the pears to create the tart case.

Step 4.

Whisk up an egg and brush over the pastry. Place in the oven and bake for around 45 mins until the pastry is crisp and the filling is soft. Serve with some yoghurt, crème fraiche or warming custard!


